Well, it has certainly been an interesting winter—plenty of cloudy days, misty skies, a few snowflakes that you could catch on your tongue, and some bitter cold winds. When I was your age, it seems that our winters were usually snowy, icy and cold

with blustery winds that came off the Great Lakes. It was a wonderful time for kids (not people who had to drive to work) as we had times of ice skating and sledding. However, we NEVER had a day off school to enjoy these activities. Many times we were a bit late as the school buses needed time in the morning to install chains on their tires. Times have changed and so has the climate; now the winters seem a bit warmer and somewhat dreary. We now are in the wonderful month of April and as you have experienced, our Heavenly Father, is always continuing with the wheel of the seasons. SPRING is almost here and God is giving us new life and rebirth.
