We cry out for the resurrection of our lives, when Christ will come again in beauty and power to share with us the great and promised feast. Amen. Come, Lord Jesus.

hese are words from one of the Eucharistic Prayers that is often used in the Easter season. They are words that celebrate the new life that comes through Jesus, and particularly through his death and resurrection. But as we pray this prayer, what does it mean to cry out for the resurrection of our lives?

I suppose it means we need to recognize that there are parts of our lives that feel dead. There are those hurts and disappointments, those divisions and separations that have festered and grown over time that leave us feeling cut off and alone, without hope or a clear path forward into the future. There may be a desire, a cry, that God would bring healing, hope, and restoration to such situations in our lives.

I suppose it may also be a chance to recognize that there are those things within us that need to die so that what is good and pleasing, to God and to ourselves, can grow in its place. What are those things for you? Is it resentment, prejudice, jealousy, pride, anger? We have the image in Scripture of a gardener that prunes away the parts of the tree that are not healthy and which inhibit good growth and the ability of the tree to bear fruit. What "dead wood" do we need to have pruned away so that the love of God can fully take root and new life can bloom in us?

I suppose it is also a recognition of, and a yearning for, the fulfillment of the promise that Jesus makes to his disciples, "Where I am, there you may be also." In the Eucharistic feast we have a thinning of the veil between heaven and earth, a "foretaste of the feast to come," as we share a meal with Jesus, who is our resurrection and our life, in whom we have our hope and our confidence.

In the Easter season in particular we celebrate the promise that this world is not all there is, but that, through Christ, we can see in death the gate to eternal life. As we continue to live in this world where there is so much disappointment, separation, brokenness, sin and death, how can we not cry out for resurrection to the life and world God is preparing for all who

love him? And so, it is fitting that we pray this prayer, and we conclude our cry with, "Amen! Come, Lord Jesus!"

May you feel the power of the resurrection as you live in the love of Jesus Christ, our Risen Lord.

We have made it through the long, dark, days of winter, now it is time to get ready for spring. Spring always reminds me of new beginnings. Spring is a wonderful time to find all the creations that the Lord has made for us.

Here are some activities to do with your families to celebrate Spring:

- Plant new life: Get your gardening gear out and allow your child to help in planting new life. Show them how to prepare the soil, where to plant the seeds, and how to nurture and protect the plant daily. - Spring cleaning with the whole family: After the work is done, treat your children to their favorite food.
