From Our Pastor

Connect Care eQuip Cultivate

This is a word that has come my way often in the past several weeks. In articles I have read, in programs I have seen, in conversations I have had, everywhere there seems to be a cry for, a desire for, hope.

Hope.

What comes to your mind when you see this word? Do you have any hope? Or does it seem there is none to be found? As we continue to come out of covid, as we witness the ongoing war on Ukraine, as we live with the inflation that comes as oil and grain supplies are restricted because of this war, as we continue with other struggles around the world, as we experience tension and unrest in our divided country, is there any room for hope? Where can we turn for a sense of hope?

We turn to so many places to find hope in a difficult world. We turn to family, until or unless our family is divided. We turn to our friends, until we feel we have no right to go to them again. We turn to distractions: movies, television, books, walks in the park, drives in the country, trips to the gym. Yet often these things do not fill our need; they do not give any lasting sense of hope.

We know we should turn to God. We know we should lean on Jesus. But sometimes even that feels lacking, as it does not always seem as though we are heard. Or we wish we could hear something back, but we do not have a tangible sense of the presence of Jesus. Yet, particularly as we enter Advent and anticipate Christmas, I want you to remember that *Jesus is* our hope.

Perhaps it helps to remember that, in scripture, "hope" is not the same as "wish." It is not the same as "I *hope* I get this for Christmas." It is rather a statement of confidence in what God has done, and is doing, for us in the person of Jesus. I have this hope, this confidence, this assurance, that God does love us, that God is active, that we are never alone, that there is indeed reason to hope.

The first letter attributed to Peter puts it this way: "Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ! By his great

mercy he has given us a new birth into a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead ⁴ and into an inheritance that is imperishable, undefiled, and unfading, kept in heaven for you." – 1 Peter 1:3-4.

Or as our liturgy says, "In sure and certain hope of the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead, we commend to almighty God our beloved."

As we come to this holy season, we are reminded of Jesus coming to us. There is a sense in this season, even in the midst of the hustle and bustle, that there is something more, something beyond, some cause for hope. In some ways we sense hope whenever we see a child, and as we prepare to welcome the Christ Child, the hope we have is sure.

But this hope is sure not because of a baby. It is secure because this Baby of Bethlehem is also the Christ of the Cross. Keith and Krystin Getty are contemporary hymn writers, whose work we have sung. In one of their hymns, "Christ, Our Hope in Life and Death" they write the following:

What is our hope in life and death? Christ alone, Christ alone! What is our only confidence? That our souls to him belong. Who holds our days within his hand? What comes, apart from his command? And what will keep us to the end? The love of Christ, in which we stand.

I do not just *wish* you a merry Christmas. I remind you of the hope that is ours in the Babe, the Christ, the Lord Jesus, our hope in life and death.

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Worship and Music Notes

dvent means arrival or coming and is a time of expectation and hope. Ideally Advent should be a time where Christians involve themselves in activities that remind them why we celebrate the birth of the Messiah. Saint Matthew has a full slate of activities and worship opportunities this Advent and Christmas season.

For the beginning of Advent, the Worship and Music Committee sent Advent devotion booklets to our members. In addition to these booklets, this year with the Christian Education Committee Advent devotional activity books were also sent to the families of young children. Hopefully these activity booklets will provide a tool for the families to create traditions and memories for this season.

During each of the services on the four Sundays in Advent (8:00 a.m. and 10:15 a.m.) we will be lighting the candles in the Advent Wreath, lighting an additional candle each Sunday until Christmas Eve. On each of the first three Wednesdays during Advent we are bringing back the Holden Evening Prayer Service at 7:30 p.m. For anyone who hasn't experienced it, the Holden Evening Prayer Service is an extraordinarily beautiful and moving service.

Sunday, December 18th marks the fourth Sunday in Advent and will be a busy day. During the 10:15 a.m. service, our Sunday School children and youth will be presenting a Christmas play. Following that service, we will have a light luncheon at 11:30 and then the Hanging of the Greens. Many hands are needed as we will be decorating the church both inside and out.

On the last Wednesday during Advent (December 21st) we will hold a Candlelight Caroling, Cookies, and Cocoa event at 6:30 p.m. This event is scheduled to be held outside in our parking lot, but will be moved inside in the event of uncooperative weather. Uncooperative weather generally means rain or snow, but if it is bone-chilling cold like last year, we will be inside. Last year looked a bit like a drive in where innovative folks sat in their warm cars enjoying the carols.

Once again we will be asking for donations to sponsor poinsettias to help in the decoration of the church. This year we are requesting donations of \$10. Please sign up in the hallway or call the church office to sponsor and dedicate a poinsettia. There will also be a sign-up for cookies for the luncheon for the Hanging of the Greens and for the caroling.

Summary: In October we were in the red for \$5,800 while YTD we are in the negative for \$41,900. (Budgeted loss for the year is \$38,000). From a budget standpoint we remain behind on envelope giving by about \$16,800 for the year. Children's Corner

ear Children, AH—we are now in the Season of Advent and soon the Big Day will be upon us. I am imagining that you and your family are busy shopping, wrapping gifts, baking cookies, and decorating the house. It certainly is a fun time. Here It comes!!—"Back in the Day"—yes revered moments of "yesteryear" have made me think of my own childhood and the customs of the day which I would like to share with you. As I have mentioned before, I was raised in the Baptist Church in a small town south of Buffalo and the winters were ICY AND COLD!! I don't remember being chilled because we always dressed for those icy winters and hot chocolate was always available. One of my favorite memories was Christmas caroling we kids all climbed aboard a huge wagon pulled by someone's truck and ventured out into the starry sky to sing carols to our shut-ins. The president of our Youth Fellowship played the ukulele and we even managed some harmony. At most of the homes, the wagon was parked outside, but at one of the homes we all trudged inside where a lovely German lady (almost 100) sang to us. She always sang "Silent Night" in German and she always had tears streaming down her face as she sang. Although I always thought she was sad because she missed her family and homeland, I did not realize the true meaning of her tears until years later. You see, I am a bit of a history buff (especially WWII) and never thought of the horrible conditions in Germany my guess being, that this sweet lady was remembering this country that she once loved with all the beautiful music and culture that was silenced during the War. Her favorite carol was "Silent Night" and I will tell you the history of this much-loved

This beloved carol was first heard over 200 years ago as it was sung by Austrian villagers who belonged to Saint Nicholas Church. The idea for this hymn came from a priest, Joseph Mohr, who was taking a walk one cold and snowy night after a

brutal war in Europe. As he walked the streets of the little village he noticed the solemnity as he gazed at the stars—as he reveled in the peaceful evening, he composed the words to "Silent Night." The music was written by Frantz Gruber and the two sang it accompanied by Frantz on the guitar. An organ-builder took a copy of this song to his home village and spread this glorious hymn to two families of folk singers - thus this famous carol was born and has been translated into 300 languages.

Dear Parents,

When I was growing up, we sang Christmas carols starting right after Thanksgiving but, of course, many churches wait until Advent or Christmas Eve. Regardless, one might be motivated to find out different holiday traditions from your friends and neighbors of various faiths. Many books are available to tell legends and true stories of the birth of the Christ Child. The story is found, of course, in the Gospels—however which Gospel does not mention the birth, but rather talks of the ministry of Jesus? Look at the birth stories in Matthew and Luke—how are they different?


