

From Our Pastor

Connect Care eQuip Cultivate

A certain radio station has already begun their nonstop Christmas music playlist for the rest of the year. Each year they have a Top 100 Christmas favorites list. What is your favorite Christmas song? There are so many from which to choose. There are secular songs about reindeer and snowmen. There are songs about firesides and loved ones. There are dance songs and humorous songs. There are religious songs, some upbeat like Joy to the World, some reflective like Silent Night.

May I suggest a "sleeper song" in the countdown? One that will not likely ever make the radio countdown, nor would it make most of our playlists. It is a song that is in the "Communion" section of the hymnal, and so it does not hit most people's radar when we shout our Christmas favorites. I am suggesting for your consideration, "Let All Mortal Flesh Keep Silence."

This song is in a minor key, and so it is more reflective than jubilant in tone. But its call to recognize the awe of being in the presence of Jesus, along with its reminder that, while Jesus is our friend he is also the Almighty God, gives a depth of perspective to the celebration that I sometimes do not recognize in the more joyful and more playful songs of the season. Its reminder that the God of all creation has come near, and continues to come near to us in the Eucharist, is a reminder of both the transcendence and the imminence of God.

Tradition holds that this song has its origin in the "Liturgy of St. James," an ancient liturgy believed to have roots in the Jerusalem ministry of the Apostle James the Just, half-brother of Jesus. It is based in part on Habakkuk 2:20, where we read, "The Lord is in his holy temple; let all the earth keep silence." We cannot know this, but imagine if we are singing words that can trace back to Jesus' own brother James and the congregation of the faithful he gathered in Jerusalem!

I trust you are familiar with the tune. The version of the song we have was composed by an Anglican minister and scholar, Gerard Moutrie, in 1859. Here are the words for your reflection:

Let all mortal flesh keep silence, and with fear and trembling stand.

Ponder nothing earthly minded, for with blessing in his hand Christ our God to earth descending, comes our homage to demand.

King of kings, yet born of Mary, as of old on earth he stood, Lord of lords in human vesture, in the body and the blood, he will give to all the faithful his own self for heav'nly food.

Rank on rank the host of heaven spreads its vanguard on the way;

as the Light of light, descending from the realms of endless day, comes, the pow'rs of hell to vanquish, as the darkness clears away.

At his feet the six-winged seraph, cherubim with sleepless eye, veil their faces to the presence, as with ceaseless voice they cry: "Alleluia! Alleluia! Alleluia, Lord Most High!"

May the wonder and the awe of the incarnate God be with you in this Advent and Christmas season.

Summary: September closed with a deficit; however, year-to-date we remain positive. Compared to the projected year-to-date budget deficit, we are performing better than expected. Monthly expenses were consistent with expectations, and year-to-date expenses remain closely aligned with the budget. No unusual or unexpected expenses were noted.

Envelope/General Giving: While envelope giving for the month was lighter at \$21,400, overall income for the year continues to trend ahead of budget. Your continued support truly strengthens our faith community.

The Four Advent Candles

Week 1: HOPE

We light the first candle to remind us that Jesus is our hope. **Try this at home:** Think of one thing you hope for this Christmas season—not a gift, but something for your heart.

Week 2: PEACE

The second candle reminds us that Jesus brings peace to the world.

Activity: Draw a picture of a peaceful place where you feel close to God.

Week 3: JOY (The pink candle!)

This special candle celebrates the joy that Jesus brings.

Challenge: Do something this week that makes someone else smile!

Week 4: LOVE

The last candle reminds us that God loved the world so much, He sent Jesus.

Question to think about: How can you show God's love to someone in your family?
