"Whoever is faithful in a very little is faithful also in much, and whoever is dishonest in a very little is dishonest also in much." – Luke 16:10

In our relationships, faithfulness is key. We know this to be the case. In this month when we celebrate Valentine's Day, in which those who do not have a significant other might hope for one, and when people who do have a significant other are encouraged to re-affirm their affection for their beloved, it becomes a time in which we are reminded how faithfulness is the basis and ground of such a loving and longed for relationship. If one is found faithless in small things, it is difficult to trust that person with the truly important things of our lives and of our hearts. When faith is broken, the relationship is also. When faith is gone, the relationship typically ends.

As Christians we are called to be faithful to God and faithful to our neighbors, following the example of the One whose name we bear. This is true in our most personal relationships — with family and significant others. But this is also true in all our relationships — even with neighbors we do not know, or do not like. In Christ we are called to be faithful in our relationships with them, even when they are faithless to us. This is not a call to be a doormat. This is not a call to be a fool. It is a call to act with care and concern for the well-being of others, just as Jesus is concerned for their well-being. We are called to live with integrity, even in a world that does not always value integrity.

The Church is called to be the embodiment of Jesus. We are often called "the hands and feet" of Christ. As such, we are called to care for those that the world overlooks. I am remembering the story of the Good Samaritan, who cared for the man set upon by robbers, even though the man who was hurt (a Jew) would ordinarily have no regard for the man who gave him aid (a Samaritan). At the end of this story Jesus asked, "Who acted like a neighbor to the one who was harmed? Go, and do likewise." I am remembering the story of the rich man who walked over the poor, diseased man named Lazarus, with no regard for the condition of this, his neighbor. In this story, it does not go well for the rich man, as his reward when he dies is not paradise, but torment, because he did not honor the call to Love God with one's whole heart and Love one's Neighbor as

oneself. I am remembering the many times the Scriptures call the faithful to feed the hungry, clothe the naked, care for the widow and orphan in their distress, and protect the foreigner who lives in your neighborhood.

In our relationships, faithfulness is key. Regardless of how the world acts, we are called to act with integrity. Regardless of the faithful-, or faithless-ness of others, Christians are called to be faithful in our love of God, and love of neighbor. It can be hard, but faithfulness is what makes true relationships possible. Being faithful in little demonstrates we can be faithful in much.

May you live as faithful servants of Jesus, even in a faithless world, so that the Love of Jesus may be made known.

Summary: For December we finished in the negative almost \$3,300. For 2024 we ended in the negative of over \$25,000. Our budgeted loss for the year was a little over \$23,000.

Additional Cost to Budget: We spent \$8,300 for the replacement of the control box for the Elevator Sump Pump in December.

Envelope/General Giving: We ended with December giving of \$35,409, higher than budgeted. Although, Year to date our giving was just over \$342,000 we fell short by \$9,000 of budgeted amount for the year.
