Children's Corner

Dear Children,

s we read this newsletter, many of us have that "let down" feeling as the rush and excitement of Christmas is now past, Land now what? Well, actually those people who belong to the Eastern Orthodox churches have their Christmas with gifts and special celebrations on January 6th and often call it "little Christmas." Officially, however, we are celebrating the Season of Epiphany. The word Epiphany means "manifestation" or the showing of Christ to the Gentiles (those who were not Jewish.) We also think of Epiphany as the worshiping of Jesus by the Wise Men (Magi) from the East. Matthew is the only Gospel that tells the story of the Wise Men coming from the East and information about them is quite scarce. The word Magi means "sage" (a person noted for wisdom), and it is possible that they were astrologers from Persia. They realized that the King of the Jews had been born when they saw an exceptionally brilliant star rising in the East. Some people believe that this special star was really a mix of the sun, moon, and other stars. These men followed the star to Bethlehem, and each brought the Christ Child a special gift. The stories of the Wise Men are often conflicting, and may perhaps be legendary, but the following information will give you some interesting details:

"The first king was called Melchior, and he was an old man with white hair and a long beard; he offered gold to our Lord. The second, Gaspar, was young, beardless, and had a reddish face; he offered frankincense to Jesus. The third, Balthasar, was an African, with a heavy beard who offered myrrh - a heavy perfume that foretold the death of Jesus."

Many other legends surround this wonderful piece of history, and it has been fun for me to revisit these stories. Moving beyond the many legends, we know that Epiphany represents a special time in the Church Year. On the First Sunday of Epiphany the paraments are white for purity, and the Sundays thereafter, the colors are green symbolizing the growth of the church and our growth in Christ as we journey through life.

Dear Parents,

"We Three Kings of Orient Are" will give your youngster an idea of the journey and gifts of each "king." Take time to review all the words as they tell a story. A map would be helpful too as you can locate the origin of the Wise Men - Persia, Ethiopia, and Bethlehem - trace the distance that the Magi had to travel. Discuss their mode of transportation. Check out our library for more information.

Dear Friends,

We recently received your gift of \$140.00 to Lutheran World Relief. Thank you! I'd like to share a story of the great work your gift will support.

Sevu once struggled to support his family on his farm in Kenya's notoriously dry Makindu district. The region has a rainy season during which the Makindu river bed fills with water, but farmers didn't have a good way to capture that water. This made it difficult for Sevu to grow food to eat and sell year round, With your gift, you provide lasting solutions for farmers like Sevu. With local partners, we worked to install a sand dam - a structure built onto a dry river bed that captures water-filled sand and holds it in place. Now, Sevu and his family have a source of water for growing crops year round and, because of the sand dam, he can afford to send his children to school and they no longer struggle with chronic hunger.

On behalf of LWR, our partners and those we serve, please accept my thanks for your generous support and partnership. May God bless you!
