H appy Anniversary! Happy Anniversary! 2017 is a significant year for Saint Matthew Lutheran Church. This year we will celebrate two significant anniversaries. The one is our 75th anniversary as a community of faith. We were started in 1942 by the efforts of Pr. Donald Doll to form a congregation in Springfield Township. We have grown over those years from a start-up congregation worshipping in the old firehouse, to the established ministry we are today with the lovely facilities we have for worship and service in Christ's name.

The second anniversary is the 500th year since the beginning of the Reformation. On October 31, 1517 Dr. Martin Luther (not Martin Luther King!) put his 95 theses, or points for debate, on the door of the Castle Church in Wittenberg, Germany. He invited people to come and discuss with him the very foundation of how we are forgiven and made right with God, and began a process of calling the Church back to the Gospel. This beginning led to the establishment of what we know as the Lutheran church today.

Often when we come to a new year we make resolutions to change and move forward. This is a good thing to do, but sometimes we need to look back at where we started to see if where we wish to go still matches with the hopes, dreams, and identity of who we have been. This is the case with this year, and anniversaries we will celebrate. We have a long history as a Church, and as a congregation, of living out the Gospel of Jesus. We have a longstanding practice of connecting with God and each other, caring for the needs of those who are hurting, forsaken, and in need, equipping people for a living faith in Jesus, and cultivating a generous spirit among those who call Jesus their Lord. Remembering from whence we come can be significant as we look to live out this faith into the new year and beyond. As we go through 2017 we will have the chance to celebrate our history. But we are always looking for how God is calling us to be Jesus' people to those around us today. As we live faithfully in this time, supported by the witness and encouragement of those who went before us, we set the stage for the work of the Church and our congregation to continue well into the future. May God, our refuge and strength, lead us and guide us into the future God sees for us as we live in service to the Gospel today.

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The Vicar's View: Sin, Fresh Starts, and the Persistence of Love

I 'm my own worst enemy." We've all heard people use this expression. Perhaps we've even said it ourselves. We all act against our own best interests sometimes, doing things that we know will be harmful to our mental or physical well-being or that of others. How often do we seek happiness and contentment in things that we know from experience will never really satisfy us? How many of our interpersonal relationships have we attempted to sabotage out of fear and insecurity, sometimes subconsciously? We turn away from God, or become angry when our lives don't go the way we planned. On top of all this, we often feel the need to punish ourselves for the mistakes we've made. We put up a barrier against self-forgiveness and mercy, a wall so strong and high that it feels like God couldn't even break through it.

In his letter to the Romans, the Apostle Paul expresses his frustration at his moral failings very simply: "For the good that I want to do, I do not do; but the evil I do not want to do, that is what I do" (7:19). This is not to say that we are incapable of doing anything good in the course of our lives. Nonetheless, I can sympathize with Paul here. Our flaws and weaknesses can sometimes make us feel like we are beyond the reach of God. It seems like a desperate, unsolvable situation.

How can God love us when we've made so many mistakes, when we know we've failed God and hurt other

people? Paul's response is what makes the good news of forgiveness in Jesus Christ so incredibly freeing. Nothing at all in God's creation, Paul concludes, "can separate us from the love of God which is in Christ Jesus our Lord" (Romans 8:39). Not death, angels, things in the present, things to come. And not our weaknesses, our regrets, or our past acts of cruelty to other people.

Whatever sins we've committed against God and neighbor in the last year, whoever we've hurt or treated without compassion, I pray that this coming year will give us new opportunities for reconciliation and healing. I pray that, throughout 2017, you will know that God's arms are always poised to wrap around you and welcome you back into the love that we were all made for. Amen.

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Children's Corner

Dear Children,

"Ask, and it will be given to you." Matthew 7:7.

ooking at this verse as a young child, I always felt special because I thought that I could ask God for a new doll, a perfect spelling paper, nice weather for our 7th grade picnic, etc.--I now call these prayers "red bicycle prayers." Now as an adult, I feel that God wants us to have an ongoing dialogue with Him where we can always share our frustrations and desires -- He will eventually decide what He thinks is best for us. While growing older, I have steered away from "red bicycle prayers" (although I have on occasion asked for sunny weather) and have tried to broaden my circle of thought and ask for prayers of healing, and alleviating hunger, homelessness, and violence. I suppose some of us hesitate in asking for help because we pride ourselves on our own resourcefulness--"We can do it and don't need any help!" Just when we are feeling real independent, we need to remember that God is always there and is bending his ear down to hear all our little conversations with Him. He wants to know our fears, our needs, our joys, our sadness, and our blessings. Although prayers may not always be answered in our favor, they are usually answered in some unique way. Several years ago, in our 6:30 a.m. Bible Study, we were deep into this discussion (Matthew 7:7) and I mentioned the term "red bicycle prayers" and went on to say that I try not to ask for "things" like that any more as I now feel that they are selfish. Well, about two weeks

later a small white box came in the mail addressed to me--no return address! When I opened the box--guess what? At the bottom of the box nestled in white tissue paper was a shiny little red bicycle! I was flabbergasted! And--of course, I tried for about a year to nail down the sender, but I had no luck. It had to be someone in that early morning class! I had always wondered who took the time to remind me that God loves me and wanted to tell me that He is always there for me. Well, about two years ago, I ran into an old friend who was in that Bible Study, but had moved out of our area. As we were chatting, I asked him if he knew anything about my red bicycle. He threw his head back and laughed and said, "Why, Sylvia, yes it was me,--I just wanted to remind you that God wants to help us and often His help comes even when we don't ask."

Dear Parents:

This reading from Matthew is surely inspiring and you might want to read chapters 5-7 as they contain wonderful wisdom and insight for all of us.

"How big is an elephant, Dad?" My Mom and Dad had announced that we were going to the circus. My little sister Janette and I had never seen an elephant. From pictures in books I had seen them but could not imagine how big they were up close and "in person."

"Well, son" my Dad said, "An elephant is as big as the garage! We had a single car garage off the street at our house and I knew how big that was, but I was skeptical that an animal could be anywhere near the size of a garage!

I remember one day I was showing off with a school friend and wanted to play Tarzan. I climbed up on the garage roof and, with a blood-curdling yell, jumped off! It was a long way down. My body picked up speed very rapidly and when my feet hit the lawn beside the garage, my heels dug into the ground and I rolled to one side in pain, with the breath knocked out of me from the force of the landing. Needless to say, I didn't try that stunt again. So I knew how big the garage was.

The day of the circus dawned and into the city we went, full of anticipation for an encounter with elephants. Mom asked me to hold onto little Janette's hand while we walked toward the big top. Dad went ahead to buy tickets ad we followed with the crowd. There were colorful sights and activities all around us and off to one side was a large tent which had closed flaps. I wanted to see inside. Janette came with me as we approached and I lifted the flap. The sight which greeted us could not be more scary for two kids together. We were face to face with an elephant! I had never seen anything so big! Dad was right, I thought. We stood transfixed at the sight of this awesome mountain of grey leathery hide and huge trunk that unfurled toward us in curiosity. We nearly fell over each other as we ran! My Mom said we had eyes as big as "gig-lamps!"

The circus under the big top was a wonder of color, movement and music as the performers introduced white horses, clowns, bears, lions and elephants. We were enthralled and also loved the trapeze artists and colorful costumes. We talked about the circus for days afterwards, and I never doubted my Dad again.

Friends at school were big talkers and I learned now that the truth was mostly less than their exaggerations. Perhaps that is why I had not been so convinced by my father's vivid comparison with our garage. I always took him at his word after that discovery.

Remembered incidents from growing up give us pleasure and reassurance in the present. Yes, they are personal presents that come to us from the High Power Source. That source of all creation. Thank you, thank you and thank you.

appy New Year! A New Year to reflect and move on to make things better. This month's book is *The Call to Wholeness* by Kenneth L. Bakken found on Shelf 248.4 BAK. We all encounter times of physical illness as well as emotional psychological, and spiritual distress and pain. We are all in need of healing—in every aspect of life.

In this book, a physician specializing in preventive medicine integrates learnings from both science and religion to present a holistic approach to well-being that is rooted in a new understanding of Christian principles—an approach that has already proven effective in countless lives. Using examples of people who have been healed, Dr. Bakken shows how stress (fear, anxiety, anger, guilt, depression, loneliness, and unforgiveness) contributes to dis-ease and how spiritual growth ("perfect love casts out fear") promotes health, healing, and wholeness.

The call to wholeness demonstrates that God is the author, renewer, and sustainer of all life, and the ultimate source of all healing. It challenges individuals, the Church, and the medical establishment to expand their view of reality in the context of a Christ-centered spirituality which can bring true and lasting wholeness to each and all of us.
