

The song "Seasons of Love" from the musical "Rent" asks this question, with the recognition that 525,600 minutes is not sufficient to summarize all a year encompasses. It is too limiting to speak of a year simply in terms of seconds, minutes, and hours. It is too simplistic to refer to a year as one more trip around the sun. A year needs to be measured by all the events that happen in that trip, in those seconds, and minutes, and hours. Or, as in this song from Rent, measured in love.

There is so much that has happened in 2022. There has been a coming to terms, of sorts, with Covid-19 – not gone, but being managed. There has been a year of war in Ukraine. There has been the global effect this war has had on the economy, as the world has limited Russia's exporting oil to fund this war, and Russia has blocked the sending of grain and farm produce from Ukraine to Europe and beyond. Both actions have put inflationary pressures on the global system.

Hate crimes against persons who are LGBTQIA, anti-Semitism, and anti-Muslim violence are on the rise. Anti-Asian, anti-choice, anti-marriage equality, anti-, anti-, anti-. The level of suspicion and derision has increased exponentially over the past year. With all that has happened, can we measure 2022 in love?

Into such a world as this came Jesus, the Messiah, the Anointed One, the Beloved. He came to be a light in the midst of the darkness. He came to bring hope to those who are oppressed and despairing. He came to measure our lives not in where we have fallen short, but in the immeasurable depth and breadth of love – God's love – which is given that we might know, and be known, in love.

¹⁶For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life. ¹⁷Indeed, God did not send the Son into the world to condemn the world but in order that the world might be saved through him. – John 3:16, 17

Jesus came to give, and to receive, love. Jesus came to show us the way of love, and call us to love one another, as he has loved us.

It is through living with each other in the seconds and minutes and hours of life that love makes its mark. It is in bearing each other up in the pain, as well as celebrating with each other in the joys, that love grows. It is how a year matters. It is how a life matters. So, as

we come to the end of one year, let us look back and see what love we were permitted to give, and to receive. And as we begin the next year, let us never tire of loving, and seeking times when we can offer love. In so doing, we experience the fullness of life. In so doing, we see the presence of God. In so doing, we measure a year in that which is most important.

Children's Corner

ear Children, Some time during this Epiphany Season, you will probably be singing, "We Three Kings of Orient Are." I have always been entranced by the haunting melody and the remarkable story of these travelers. Moving from a child to an adult, each year, I have learned some amazing facts about these Wise Men and the Star of Bethlehem. I have been delving into some information about this wonderful period of time and I will share some interesting facts with you—however, keep in mind that science will probably never know the exact truth. So—as you read, please understand as science becomes more definitive, more facts will appear, or maybe change. I think I have always assumed that there were THREE Wise Men (or Kings/ Magi) because of the Three gifts. There may be more kings, maybe less. Looking at your hymnal, you will see their names Gaspar, Melchior and Balthasar; and they did come from the East--probably Iran, India and Arabia. They were indeed men of distinction and were astrologists, and for years had been reading the Old Testament and watching the Heavens for signs of the coming of the Christ Child. This Christmas song needs all verses to be sung as each verse makes up a wonderful story: the GOLD reminds us of divinity--God in the Flesh, also gold stands for royalty; FRANKINCENSE is a fragrant spice symbolizing His willingness to be a sacrifice; and MYRRH is also a spice, but it tells us of bitterness and suffering.

As a child, I thought that the Three Kings traveled from the East and arrived a day or so after the Christ Child was born—if I would have REALLY thought about it, I would have placed their arrival months or even years after the birth considering the distance from the EAST to Bethlehem which is 800-900 miles and also traveling by camel would be slow. Some historians place the arrival in a house somewhere. Did you ever look up in the starry sky at night after Christmas and try to imagine A Star of Bethlehem? What would make it so bright? Scientists say perhaps a super nova, a comet, solar fire, or maybe an alignment of Venus and Jupiter!! Anyway, I wanted you to have more information than I did—perhaps you can find out

more from your science teacher, science magazines, or the internet.

Dear Parents,

The Book of Matthew is a great story and may answer some questions about this miraculous birth. The Old Testament will tell of the prophesies that were helpful to the Three Kings—Daniel 9:24-27; Isaiah 9:6; and Micah 5:2. Read them as a family and be sure to discuss how each of the Wise Men must have felt as they obeyed God's Word. You might want to find out if this star has ever appeared in our time. Did you ever wonder if you had lived at this time, would you have made this arduous journey to see the Christ Child?
