"Taking a cup of kindness" with friends is good, but the idea that it is for auld lang syne, old times' sake, is difficult. I know that all things and all people come and go. Everything has its time and season, and then we move on to whatever is next, but sometimes the passing of the old is more than I wish to bear. From whence does my help come? <sup>2</sup> My help comes from the Lord, who made heaven and earth. <sup>3</sup>He will not let your foot be moved, he who keeps you will not slumber. <sup>4</sup>Behold, he who keeps Israel will neither slumber nor sleep. <sup>5</sup> The Lord is your keeper; the Lord is your shade on your right hand. <sup>6</sup> The sun shall not smite you by day, nor the moon by night. <sup>7</sup> The Lord will keep you from all evil; he will keep your life. <sup>8</sup> The Lord will keep your going out and your coming in from this time forth and for evermore.

I particularly like the last verse: "The Lord will keep your going out and your coming in, from this time forth and forevermore." No matter where we go, no matter if our time is short or long in the place we find ourselves, no matter if we are coming or going, God is with us. Seems like a familiar word, as we move from Christmas to Epiphany, celebrating Emmanuel, God with us, as the One who is revealed in the new year.
