

#### From Our Pastor

Connect Care eQuip Cultivate

"The beginning of the Gospel (Good News) of Jesus Christ, the Son of God." - Mark 1:1

While we began a new Church Year with Advent on November 30th, the new calendar year begins this month. As we come to a new year, we often think about what we would like to do in the coming days. It may be something we have not done before, like exploring a new city or country. It may be a chance to change a pattern of behavior we have found to be a problem, with the thought of making better decisions going forward. Whatever it is, we may feel a certain pressure? impetus? opportunity? to start again, and find what is new for our life. Which brings to my mind (thanks to a prompting from my wife) the above verse from Mark. She asks, "What is "new" about the Good News of Jesus Christ, the Son of God?" Particularly for those of us who have been a part of the Church for many years, is there anything "new" about Jesus at all?

At our December Council meeting, Joe Link, our Vice President, raised a similar question for the Council's consideration. He asked, "In what new way are you planning to bring Jesus more into your celebration of the holiday?"

As Christians we say we believe that Jesus still lives and moves among us by the Holy Spirit. When we proclaim "the mystery of the faith," we say that Christ has died, Christ IS risen, Christ will come again. If we believe that Christ IS risen, and still moves among us, then how can we make sure we do not keep Jesus in the past? How can we ensure we allow Jesus to "make all things new" in us?

This is not always easy. At Christmas time we are often so focused on the baby in the manger that we romanticize the Savior. We hold him in a place and time that is comforting and safe, full of memory and sentiment. But since Christ came as Emmanuel, God with us, how can we see the new in the Good News of Jesus Christ? I suppose one way to see what is new is to keep in constant contact with the One who first came so long ago. By prayer and worship, by meditation and reflection on the word, we can hear again what Jesus has to say.

In my family, before we eat a meal, we say a prayer. Very often this prayer is, "Come, Lord Jesus, be our guest and let these gifts to us be blessed." One thing is true: when we ask Jesus to be

present, Jesus shows up. What is also true is that when we ask Jesus to be present, we don't always sit still long enough to welcome him.

But when we make room, both for Jesus to come, and for us to listen, we can experience the love of God in new ways, in each new day. We may find that we are comforted in ways we cannot imagine. Or we may find we are challenged in ways that make us uncomfortable. As Jesus speaks to us, we may begin to sense that what we thought Jesus said might not be what Jesus actually said. By engaging with the Word, we can be sure that the story of Jesus does not become "old hat," but remains fresh and new.

And so, we begin a new year. As we move through the days to come, may you always be made new by the Good News that God, in Jesus, continues to reconcile the world to himself, and us to each other.
