#### From Our Pastor

# Christ is Risen! He is Risen Indeed! Alleluia!

s we continue through this Easter season, I want to share with you a part of an Easter

Vigil sermon from Saint John Chrysostom who lived from 347-407, and was Bishop of Constantinople from 399.

This was shared by a friend of mine, Pastor Marie Caron, on Facebook. I liked it so much I used it as part of my Easter Vigil sermon. I do not know what passage Saint John used for his sermon, but it reminds me of 1 Peter 3:18-20 and 4:5-6:

For Christ also suffered for sins once for all, the righteous for the unrighteous, in order to bring you to God. He was put to death in the flesh, but made alive in the spirit, in which also he went and made a proclamation to the spirits in prison, who in former times did not obey, when God waited patiently in the days of Noah, during the building of the ark, in which a few, that is, eight persons, were saved through water.

But they will have to give an accounting to him who stands ready to judge the living and the dead. For this is the reason the gospel was proclaimed even to the dead, so that, though they had been judged in the flesh as everyone is judged, they might live in the spirit as God does.

Here are Saint John Chrysostom's words and moving images for your reflection:

'Something strange is happening - there is a great silence on earth today, a great silence and stillness. The whole earth keeps silence because the King is asleep. The earth trembled and is still because God has fallen asleep in the flesh and he has raised up all who have slept ever since the world began. God has died in the flesh and hell trembles with fear.

He has gone to search for our first parents, as for a lost sheep. Greatly desiring to visit those who live in darkness and in the shadow of death, he has gone to free from sorrow the captives Adam and Eve, he who is both God and the son of Eve. The Lord approached them bearing the cross, the weapon that had won him the victory. At the sight of him, Adam, the first man he had created, struck his breast in terror and cried out to everyone: "My Lord be with you all." Christ answered him: "And with your spirit." He took him by the hand and raised him up, saying: "Awake, O sleeper, and rise from the dead, and Christ will give you light."

May you know that Jesus seeks you out wherever you are, so you might be given new life in and through him.

arch Summary: We had a pretty good month in March (5 Sundays) and finished to the positive for the month in the amount of \$2,162.23. However, for the first quarter ending in March, we show a deficit amount of \$6,272.45. As we have just witnessed the ultimate sacrifice of Jesus on Good Friday taking our sins to a painful death on the cross and the beautiful Resurrection of our Lord on Easter Sunday, let's continue to remember the ultimate reason that we need to support God's ministry here at Saint Matthew: For what God has done for us, we need to be His hands and feet in the world.

Giving Opportunities: There are many opportunities to assist and support our weekly worship services. ## **Church Assessment Tool Update**

hank you to all who filled out the CAT! We invited 313 people to do so, and received responses from 144. We are very pleased to have had such a strong response. The people who administer this tool were very impressed, as 144 is nearly 100% of our average worship attendance.

The Church Assessment Tool was completed early in February. At the end of February, the Council was given a presentation about what the assessment says to us and about us. At the March meeting Council continued to review and evaluate the findings that have come to us from the responses of our members. There is a great deal of information we learned. Part of what came through is how much we like our congregation. We also received confirmation of some goals and direction we want to follow as a community of faith. This includes a desire to reach out to new people, especially youth and younger families, and a need for expanded staffing to make this possible.

Council is in the process of forming a presentation to share these findings with the congregation. We want to be sure that our members are informed about what we learned, and where we plan to go. We have, as is normal, both opportunity and challenge as we go forward into the future. We want to be sure the whole congregation is "on board" with our plans (and by that, we mean our congregation's plans, not the Council's plans!) as we continue to make Jesus known in this community and in the world.

Please keep an eye out for further information. We hope to share this in our newsletter, perhaps in a special mailing, and ideally with a public opportunity to discuss and share together. Council is still trying to determine the best times and ways to share

what you have already shared with us. In the meantime, we express our deep thanks and appreciation for your participation in the process, and are excited about what we can do together as a family of faith!

The Welcome Church - A Church Without Walls

Recently Pastor Richard shared a video about The Welcome Church, A Church Without Walls, as part of one of his sermons. Many people expressed interest in learning more about this church and its ministry.

Good News! On May 20 The Reverend Violet Little of The Welcome Church will be the guest speaker for a covered-dish supper held at Saint Matthew in the Parish Education Building. The dinner will begin at 6:00 p.m. and is sponsored by Women of the ELCA. Everyone in our congregation is invited to attend.

The Welcome Church grew out of The Welcome Center, a place of healing and hospitality, founded by Pastor Little. The Welcome Center was hosted by The Lutheran Church of the Holy Communion. Eventually The Welcome Center gained its own non-religious non-profit status. It provided a ministry for people experiencing homelessness. In January 2012, The Welcome Church was officially recognized by the ELCA as a congregation under development with a mission to serve people in poverty. Come learn more about this exciting and unique ministry!

To help our meal planning, we are asking that people sign up to bring a main dish, salad, or vegetable to the covered-dish supper. The dish should feed 6 to 8 people. Sign-up sheets are on the table in the hallway. The Women of the ELCA Executive Board will provide desserts and beverages. There will also be a free-willing offering to benefit The Welcome Church.

# Children's Corner

#### Dear Children,

ast month we talked about Easter and how we can see many signs of new life - baby birds are born, meadows are housing little lambs, wild flowers are springing forth, etc. - but the Greatest Gift of all, of course, is the resurrection of Jesus, who will show us the way to heaven. As we think of new life, I am reminded of a series of wonderful animal books by the English author/veterinarian, James Herriot. He wrote, with great wisdom peppered with humor, wonderful stories of the animals he treated All Things Bright and Beautiful, All Creatures Great and Small,

All Things Wise and Wonderful, The Lord God Made Them All. Although we love dogs, apartment dwelling lends itself more to cats, so Mr. Yost and I have a very lovable cat named Clancey. Now Clancey doesn't rescue people from the woods, he doesn't come when he's called, he can't be trained to help people with disabilities, and he can't pull a little wagon. Just what can Clancey do? How can we learn from a cat? I decided to take a couple of days and record my findings of Clancey's capabilities and here's what I found:

It takes very little to make a cat content - a place in the sun seems to do it. Can we learn from that?

Cats aim for high places after making plans to jump - have you ever watched a cat aim for the top of the refrigerator? First, they focus on their sight, then they bob their little heads as if calculating (e=mc²) and go for it! Can we learn from that?

Cats seem to know when things are amiss with its ownerthey tend to cuddle more. Can we learn from that?

Cats are said to be territorial, but given the right set of circumstances are willing to share their favorite spot with a friend. We found that out when Dave brought his little cat, Ruby, over for a week. Can we learn from that?

I will even go so far as to say that I think cats are grateful. We brought Clancey home from a shelter where, although he was well cared for, was caged in a very small area. He was a bit of a "fixer upper" as he had a lot of visits to the vet. We always felt that he was happy to be in our apartment with two devoted cat lovers, because he is always at our heels, waits at the door for us to come home, purrs pretty much 24/7 and sometimes I even think he smiles! Can we learn from that?

Spring is a wonderful time to observe all that the Creator has done for us - take a peek in the meadow, the park, and look up at the sky. Take time to thank God for his goodness - and blessings we have received!
