

ay can be an awkward month for the church. It is a month for remembering, as we remember moms on Mother's Day, and soldiers who died in service on Memorial Day, but neither of those are specifically Christian holidays. Sometimes Pentecost will fall in May, depending on when Easter Sunday falls. (This year Pentecost, which will be the day of Confirmation for our youth, falls on June 8th.) In this time, we do not have Advent leading to Christmas, or Lent leading to Easter. May instead is a month when most of the programming for the year is winding down since congregations, in practice, work on a school calendar more than a yearly calendar. And so, when we get to May, many people in a congregation are focused on the ending of school, graduation celebrations, and the coming of summer vacations, whether planned time away or simply time off from the regular schedule of school and work. What often happens, though, is also a winding down in participation in worship and faith life.

Yet, the love of the Lord never fails, and the desire of God to gather with his people never ends. Nor does the chance for us to gather with God and each other or our need to serve our neighbors come to an end. We still have Sunday School and Bible Study. We still have the opportunity to worship Jesus. We still have fellowship events planned. We still need to pray for and support each other in times of ill health or other life struggles. We still see the needs of our community and our world and have a calling from Jesus to help.

The verse from Lamentations you see above is the basis of the song, "Great is Thy Faithfulness." It is a song of how in all times, and all seasons, God is faithful to us. As we move past Easter Sunday, though never past the Easter celebration, may we be faithful to the God who is always so faithful to us, through Jesus Christ our Lord.

Summary: As we review our financial performance for this past month, we want to express our deep gratitude for your continued support. Our total giving and income amounted to \$45,994 while our expenses were almost \$59,000. This resulted in a negative balance of \$12,900 for the month.

**Envelope/General Giving:** We concluded February with contributions just under \$46,000, exceeding the budgeted amount of \$38,760 for the month. Year to date we are just over \$111,377.

Giving Opportunities: Your contributions are vital for our church to thrive, and each gift plays a crucial role in our

community efforts. Thank you for your ongoing support and prayers as we navigate our fiscal year together.

Dear Barbara and the Lutheran Church Women of Saint Matthew.

Thank you for supporting Lutheran Settlement House and the children, adults, and families we serve. Your gift of \$25 spreads hope and joy, and helps our clients find safety, compassion, and healing. Your commitment makes a difference in people's lives, people like Devon.

Devon came to Lutheran Settlement House after leaving an abusive relationship. She was new to the city and looking for a community to help her heal from the abuse and chart a new course for her future. "I knew I needed to get my mental health in order to catapult forward." And catapult forward, she did. With support from her counselor and case manager, within a few months, Devon repaired her credit, created a resume, and found safe housing.

After Devon had a place to call home, she was able to focus on other goals, including her career. "I found that the people who helped me throughout my journey were the people I really wanted to be like. Because who I am today, I'm very, very proud of."

Today, Devon is a children's health case manager and member of Lutheran Settlement House's Survivors Network where she uses her experience to educate healthcare providers, researchers, and students about domestic violence.

Helping people define their future is at the heart of our work. As a donor, you remind our clients that in the most vulnerable moments of their lives, they are not alone. Thank you for being there for Lutheran Settlement House; we are honored to have you as part of our family.
