

hanksgiving is a national holiday in this country. While there have been celebrations at various times over the years, the date of the holiday as we know it was established in 1863 by President Lincoln as the 4th Thursday in November. When he established this holiday, it was set as a time to pray for the healing of the nation at the height of the Civil War. This may not be a bad thing for us to recall this year, as it feels as though our nation is nearly as divided now as we were back then.

As Christians we give thanks to God for all the blessings we have. We recognize God, and not ourselves, as the source of all that we have, and all that we are. When we pray the Lord's Prayer, we ask that God will "give us this day our daily bread." In his explanation to this petition of the prayer, Martin Luther describes "daily bread" very broadly. In his Small Catechism he writes:

What then does "daily bread" mean?

"Everything included in the necessities and nourishment for our bodies, such as food, drink, clothing, shoes, house, farm, fields, livestock, money, property, an upright spouse, upright children, upright members of the household, upright and faithful rulers, good government, good weather, peace, health, decency, honor, good friends, faithful neighbors, and the like."

And while this seems an exhaustive list, in his Large Catechism he includes even more. The bottom line is that all that we have, and all that we are, is a gift from God. And for these things, we should give thanks.

As we gather this year around tables filled with food, and TVs full of football, let us be sure to give thanks to God for all these things. And let us take the advice of President Lincoln that we pray for healing in our nation and in the world. Because the reality is that, in our world, there are far too many people, both at home, and around the globe, who do not feel blessed.

As we have been blessed, we are able to be a blessing. We are called by God to share what we have, to allow others to know they, too, can be blessed. And our ability to see the need, our ability to share from what we have, begins by recognizing the source of life's blessing, and giving thanks.

he Finance team met on October 11th. We finished the month in the red but for the year so far, we are ahead of the budget. There was a good envelope giving month, but we are still under budget for giving this year. Two of the big expenses last month were the quarterly insurance umbrella premium and the elevator repair. That put us over the budget for expenses so far this year. We are still looking for available grants or funds that would be available to Saint Matthew but haven't been able to find any yet, but we will keep on looking. Please remember to give generously to our Church if you are able.

News from Your Property Committee

uring the month of September, a new part was installed on our elevator door that allows the door to open when someone breaks the beam. They will be back in to adjust and install our phone communication box the week of October 16 or sooner.

This past month we inspected all water heaters for leaks and age of the units. There is one unit that is now ten years or older. This unit will be inspected regularly to make sure it does not fail or leak. The batteries in all the carbon monoxide detectors in the Nursery School have been changed. A protective fence was placed around the gas meter in the main courtyard.

We have received our estimate for the equipment and labor for lowering and raising the chandeliers. It was approved, parts have been put on order. Work should be done the third or fourth week in November. Again, thank you to the family who made the contribution for this to go forward. We will be asking for help in cleaning the globes and the chandeliers. Once we get a firm date, we will send out the date and time.

Although some of the <u>UNANTICIPATED REPAIR WORK</u> <u>THAT HAS TO BE DONE</u> has been done or is scheduled

to be done, the need for money is still there. If we can reimburse our general fund, it does not make us go deeper in the red of our budget. An update of the dollars in under this special fund: as of October 8th, we have collected over \$1,600.00 towards the match of \$5,000.00 from one of our families. The balance total of the remaining repairs is over \$12,500.00. Please help, it is not too late to add to our total for the match.
