





From Our Pastor

*"I lift up my eyes to the hills -
from where will my help come?
My help comes from the LORD,
who made heaven and earth.
He will not let your foot be moved;*

he who keeps you will not slumber.

He who keeps Israel

will neither slumber nor sleep.

The LORD is your keeper;

the LORD is your shade at your right hand.

The sun shall not strike you by day,

nor the moon by night.

The LORD will keep you from all evil;

he will keep your life.

The LORD will keep

your going out and your coming in

from this time on and forevermore."

- Psalm 121

The writer of this psalm reminds us that the Lord is always present, watching over us whether we are aware of it or not. The Lord watches our "going out and our coming in." I have always liked this phrase.

It strikes me as I read this psalm that the writer is experiencing hard times. He or she is looking to the hills for help; actually, looking to the Lord, who is often thought to live in the highest places. Looking to the Lord is a great place to go in times of struggle, for the Lord promises to keep our life.

I am reminded that we often look to the Lord at difficult times, but we do not always remember to do so when all is well. We take for granted the presence of God until we are in crisis, but how would it be if we looked daily to the Lord for guidance?

Many of us do have regular prayer lives. We lift up our eyes to the Lord and seek God's face, and for those who make this a regular practice, the crises of life seem easier to face. There is an awareness of the presence of God on such a regular basis that, when the hardest times hit, those of regular prayer and devotion do

not doubt whether God is there. One may still question what God is or is not doing, one may still find the situation difficult and distressing. Rarely do I sense those who regularly look to the Lord doubting that the Lord is watching over them.

The Lord watches over us whether we are aware of it or not. We can become more aware of God's presence by "lifting our eyes to the hills" on a regular basis, spending time with the One who watches our going out and coming in, who neither slumbers nor sleeps. Let us turn to the One from whom our help comes, not just in crisis, but in all the things each day brings to us. Let us rejoice in the One who keeps us from this time on and forevermore.

Children's Corner

Dear Children,

As many of you walk to the bus stop, I know you are aware of the sound of leaves crunching beneath your feet, the cool crisp feel of the air, and the treat your eyes have as you notice the leaves turning bright colors. Yes, fall is upon us and you are probably thinking about what costume you will wear for Halloween and savoring the luscious treats you might receive for trick-or-treat.

I remember all of this with great fondness, but now I see the need to think of another special day that also comes at the end of this month - **Reformation Day!** The last Sunday of October we always celebrate Reformation Day in honor of Martin Luther, an Augustinian priest, who became deeply troubled with the early church for practices that went against the teachings of Jesus. Martin Luther, after much study and prayer, "waded into the deep waters" of reforming the church and telling everyone that the only thing that Christians needed to do is accept God and He will love and forgive them. I think that the Apostle Paul was Martin Luther's hero because after reading his many letters, Luther became convinced of God's love and forgiveness. Now, you are probably wondering why the 31st of October - that is the day Martin Luther

nailed a very famous letter to the door (remember no TV, I-pads, or computers in those days) stating his feelings about unworthy practices of the church. As the turmoil in the church unfolded and wrong ideas were changed, Luther bravely preached, celebrated the Sacraments, taught, and wrote all about God's love.

After many years of struggle and torment against the church and the government, Martin Luther changed the course of church history - he translated the Bible into German and the former Latin mass evolved into the language of the people and then all could listen to the Word of God. New churches came into being - Lutheran, Methodist, Baptist, etc. - all as a result of the Protestant Reformation. The **most** important thing is that all Christians can live knowing that **Jesus, who died on the cross, has already paid for our sins, and if we have faith in Him, we are forgiven.** On Reformation Sunday, we will sing "A Mighty Fortress is Our God," and we will see **red** paraments and also someone will probably have a pin on their clothing of the Lutheran Rose.

As I am writing this for the newsletter, I am thinking back to the year 2000 when Mr. Yost and I traveled with several people from Saint Matthew to "Lutherland" and we saw the famous door where Luther nailed his proposal for a change in the church, some of the many houses where he lived, and of course many Lutheran churches. All that reminiscing reminded me of a brave and dedicated man who wanted to bring the teachings of Jesus to **all** the people.

Dear Parents,
