"Semper Reformanda" - Always Reforming

ctober is the month in which we remember the Reformation. October 31, 1517, the Reverend Dr. Martin Luther posted 95 theses on the door of the Castle Church in Wittenberg, Germany, where he was a professor of the Bible. His desire was to engage in dialogue about the practices of the Church of his day, and how those practices may need to be reformed in light of Scripture. In this case. Luther was challenging the practice of Indulgences, in which one could make an offering to the Church to gain God's indulgence for sins one had committed. Or one could offer gifts on behalf of a departed loved one to shorten their time in purgatory. Luther's reading, writing, and preaching on this and other issues challenged the church, and many reforms were made. One such reform was a recognition that it is through faith in Jesus that we are saved, and not by our works or financial gifts. Another was that human traditions cannot outweigh God's Word.

This reforming movement continued for years after Luther's day, and the very idea of re-formation became a staple of what became the "Protestant" wing of the Church. In 1647 Jodocus van Lodenstein, a minister in the Reformed Church in the Netherlands wrote a devotional book in which he used the phrase semper reformanda, always reforming. He advocated that the Church was always in need of reform to ensure it stayed true to the message of the Gospel, and not allow traditions to become a hindrance to the truth of God's Word.

Today, when we have such division, this call to be reformed by the Word of God is important. As we look for such re-formation, we need to begin with ourselves before calling for the reformation of others. We need to put in the work of reflection and self-examination, of confession and seeking forgiveness for those places where we have fallen short and done harm to others. And we need to do this in light of what the Word of God, the Gospel of Jesus, actually says, not what we sometimes pretend it says.

We are quick to determine that "the Gospel Truth" is a set of moral commands that we need to follow, and that we need to compel others to follow. While Jesus does want us to "be good," following an even stricter code of conduct is not what Jesus called us to do. Instead, he called us to have an attitude of love, of care, of generosity, for those around us. Think of it in this way: Jesus wants us to be good people, to be good to each other, not to be people who are just good at following the rules. Think of the story of the Good Samaritan. Think of Jesus healing people, even though it was the Sabbath. Think of Jesus offering forgiveness and new life to the criminal on the cross.

When we come to Jesus, the living Word of God, with openness and sincerity, our hearts can be opened, our minds can be opened, our understanding can be deepened. We can be reformed. When we are reformed into a better reflection of Jesus' love for us, the world is impacted by how we live. When the world is impacted by our renewed sense of love and concern, the world itself can be reformed.

Semper Reformanda – Always reforming. It is a call for the church. It is a call to all of us who love Jesus. It is an opportunity for the world to experience the love, grace, and mercy of God, and live in the joy of the Kingdom.

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News from the Property Committee

e reviewed the budget as of June 2022. Not having all the financial information, it is very difficult to see what our status is for the year. Hopefully we will have the numbers soon to see where we are, so we can go forward on some needed repairs.

There was discussion on the electrical problem in Elbert Hall and what we are going to do. Several ideas were discussed. We have two problems. One, the emergency lighting is now on all the time, which works off many 24 volts rectifiers. The rectifiers have failed and are now in the on position. To fix this problem emergency lights will be installed at all exits in Elbert Hall and the stairways. These will be like the ones we have done in the Education Wing and the Sanctuary. The second problem is the wiring to lights—two of the lights have melted and are not working. These lights will be replaced and new wiring to all fixtures will be done. We are waiting on an estimate from Tommy's Electric.

Permission was granted for one of our Girl Scouts to paint the new youth room, as her Gold Award project. We will remove the rest of the filing cabinets and patch the walls.

We discussed ongoing weeding of the gardens. We will be budgeting for weeding to be done throughout the growing seasons next year.

All holes where the birds were getting into the building have been closed. Come next spring we should not have birds in our building. We have also noticed the front of the church is spotted with bird droppings; this will have to be power washed in the spring.

We will have our annual fire alarm inspection and testing in November. This will be done when the Nursery Children are not in the building.

ear Children,

Having lived in the country for a large part of my life, I was used to animals and I developed a great fondness for them. We had chickens, dogs, cats, and most of our friends would walk to the bus stop with a dog or cat trailing behind. Although I am not a fan of large birds, I have always loved to watch the small birds gather at birdfeeders—fluttering their brightly colored wings and chirping softly.

A few mornings back, I came into our sunroom and saw what looked like a mound stuck to our window, so I stealthily crept towards the window and saw a beautiful golden finch. Of course, as soon as he eyed me, he quickly took flight. I was so delighted seeing this little fellow that I grabbed my iPhone to find information about this species of bird. Upon looking for information, I found out that this superb-looking little fellow is associated with celebration and JOY; and one can think of them as harbingers of good things to come. They are the state bird of New Jersey, and most can be seen all year round. I have learned through my own observation that these little birds are very common in North America. I often walk in the morning across part of our campus in our climate-controlled glassencased walkways, and I stop and look over the tree line and see these delightful birds flitting among the branches. Sometimes I can find someone to "birdwatch" with me.

As I think about the scripture above, and watch these little birds, I try to shed all my worries and appreciate God's hand in my life. When problems arise, Mr. Yost always says, "Matthew 6:26"—in other words DON'T WORRY!!!! Always a good reminder to put my worries aside and appreciate God's grace. The famous ornithologist Roger Peterson noticed that the goldfinch has a distinctive light-hearted and cheerful personality.
