hat does it mean to be a Christian living in this world? How are we to act? How are we to live? Should what we say on Sunday matter on Monday? Or is being a Christian a matter of personal belief (a sort of spiritual insurance?) that does not need to affect what we do in the world?

As we recognize the beginning of the Reformation of the Church this month, as we remember our "namesake" Martin Luther, it may be good for us to recall that he, as a priest and a professor, spent all his time teaching people how one's faith should be incorporated into everything one does, whether that be how we treat our parents, or how we do our job, or how we act in the public square. While his primary focus was to teach people of the love of God in Jesus, rather than the wrath of God so often experienced in and through the Church, the effect of that was to make a difference in people's day-to-day lives. If God has loved me, so should I love others. Since Christ died for me, a poor sinner, I should live for others. As grace and compassion has been shown to me, so should I act with grace and compassion to those around me. We should, because of who we are as Christians, live differently toward others than the world would have us live.

This is how Luther taught those in his University classes, and those in his parish to live. He wrote his Small Catechism precisely to help teach families the basics of the faith *so that* love of God would lead toward acting in love of neighbor. For instance, in his teaching on the fifth commandment (you shall not kill) Luther would say, "We are to fear and love God, so that we neither endanger nor harm the lives of our neighbors, but instead help and support them in all of life's needs." It is incumbent on the person who follows Christ to not simply avoid doing bad to a neighbor; we are called to help our neighbor as well.

But as we live out our faith, we should not confuse being faithful with being moralistic. Sometimes the need of a neighbor, just like the needs we have ourselves, are not neatly tied up in simplistic dictums of what to do, or not to do. For instance, when Jesus healed people on the sabbath, which was more important? The strict code of not "working" on the Lord's Day, or the need to help a person in pain while one has the opportunity to do so? When we live faithfully in love toward our neighbor because we have known the love of God, one's personal sense of morality needs to give way to the necessity to care for the other in *their* need. "Right" and "Wrong" needs to be answered not in terms of rules and regulations, but in light of the love, grace, and compassion of Christ. This does not mean "anything goes," but neither can it mean we have a code that, if not followed, cuts people off from each other, and presumes they are cut off from God. There is more gray than black and white in this world. There is more nuance to situations that needs to be seen before we determine what the "right" answer is. Perhaps it is not always, or ever, so much the right answer, as it is the best answer we can find at this time.

As we continue to lean into our lives as Christ's people, let us not forget that what we hear on Sunday should absolutely affect how we live on Monday – from how we treat each other, to how we do our jobs, to how we act and speak in the public square. We are called to live differently than the world. We are called to live with the love, grace, and compassion of Christ to all whom we meet. May we continually be reformed into the likeness of Jesus to live and love as he did.

The harvest theme is a pleasure for me to write about as it brings back lovely memories of my childhood. As many of you know, I was raised on a produce farm in northwestern Pennsylvania, and when Autumn was at its height, the air was chilly, colors on the deciduous trees mixed with the various pine trees were gorgeous, the night sky was illuminating, and the crops were ready for harvest. Although Dad had a regular job, his first love was the soil and he loved the challenge of raising vegetables and fruits from hard clay soil. He spent hours trying to turn unproductive soil into a garden aplenty with luscious food—blueberries, strawberries, melons, corn, asparagus, beans. potatoes, etc. One of my favorite memories in the fall was a corn roast, and I invited our Baptist Youth Fellowship. Dad and the boys built a large fire as we roasted the husked corn and Mom made Sloppy Joes—the feast was followed with singing and fellowship. On a regular evening, as Mom was cooking dinner, she would send John or me to the garden to pick out our favorite veggie. As a side job, we would help Dad sell the vegetables. Dad always told us that if we saw a family that looked like they were barely scraping by, to give them whatever they wanted. I now think what a wonderful way to share God's bounty. God provides for us and we must share his love.
