You have made public profession of your faith. Do you intend to continue in the covenant God made with you in holy baptism:

to live among God's faithful people,

to hear the word of God and share in the Lord's supper, to proclaim the good news of God in Christ through word and deed.

to serve all people, following the example of Jesus, and to strive for justice and peace in all the earth?

Each person responds:

I do, and I ask God to help and guide me.

hese are words from the rite of the Affirmation of Baptism. This rite is used for confirmation, for reception of new members, and at any time that the people of God are gathered to remember their baptism and recommit to the covenant God established with us in that first holy sacrament. These words are a repetition and reminder of the vows parents make on behalf of their children in the Sacrament of Baptism, which the confirmand, or new member, or renewing member, affirm as what they intend to do as they live in relationship with God and with neighbor in the love of Jesus. In the Sacrament of Baptism, parents make promises to God that they will raise their children in such a way that they can grow into the relationship God has established with their child, connecting with them through the death and resurrection of Jesus.

RELATIONSHIP is the key word here. We enter into a relationship with God, through Jesus, when we are washed in the water and sealed by the Word of God. God makes a promise to walk with us always, being our God, as we are his people. Baptism is not a magic spell to ward off evil. It is the starting point of a life-long relationship. As such, we need to take this word "relationship" seriously. Relationships do not happen in an instant. They do not grow to fullness overnight. They are not able to withstand all struggles and tribulations, nor be the support we need in struggle and tribulation, without investment.

Think of your own family, or your own marriage. We grow in our understanding of each other. We grow in our appreciation of each other. We grow in knowing how and when to speak, and when to keep silent; when to encourage, and when to leave alone.

Even for those who have experienced "love at first sight," the ability to fully know the other takes time, takes patience, takes commitment. We should expect no less of a relationship with God. This is why, at Baptism, parents are presented with this charge:

As you bring your children to receive the gift of baptism, you are entrusted with responsibilities:

to live with them among God's faithful people, bring them to the word of God and the holy supper, teach them the Lord's Prayer, the Creed, and the Ten Commandments.

place in their hands the holy scriptures, and nurture them in faith and prayer,

SO THAT [emphasis added] your children may learn to trust God.

proclaim Christ through word and deed, care for others and the world God made, and work for justice and peace.

Do you promise to help your children grow in the Christian faith and life?

We need to invest in any relationship for it to grow and flourish. As we come to the Fall, we begin again our investment to grow in faith and grace. We do not expect families to do this on their own. We, as a family of faith, provide help as together we learn and grow, question and develop, our understanding of who God is, how we have become part of God's family, and what difference that makes for us, and for the world.

Please be sure to join us as we begin this new program year. Sunday School, Confirmation class, Youth events, Fellowship opportunities, Service projects, and yes, Worshipping Jesus, are all ways we fulfill the vows we made to our children at their baptism, and vows we affirmed in our confirmation. But this is not about meeting an obligation, any more than investing in our marriages or our family relationships should be. This is about continuing to grow closer to Jesus, who loves us so much that he gave his life that we might live, with him, forever in the kingdom of God. This is about investing in the faith we publicly profess, and in which we live.

***** News from Your Property Committee

ompleted Work at Saint Matthew:

Over the summer we had the door between the Education Wing and main hallway to Church replaced. It was falling apart. We continued with the rewiring on the first and second floor of the Education Wing. There are old 24-volt systems which are decaying and being replaced.

Our generator has had the semi-annual inspection and is in good working order.

The dehumidifier system in Elbert Hall was repaired with new pulleys and motor. The air conditioner outside the nursery office leaked and was repaired.

Vacation Bible School was well attended, with many of our audio-visual equipment items put into use.

Weeding and trimming is ongoing; some has been done by a few. Much more to be done. We could really use help with the weeding, trimming and/or clean up. If interested, please see any member of the Property Committee.

Opportunities For You to Help with Unanticipated Repair Work that Has to be Done:

There are many ways to help your Church with one-time repairs:

1/ Our Elevator has problems with the door opening and closing and phone communication. The Elevator door eye that allows the door to close when nothing is in its path is not working and must be replaced. The phone in the car must be updated so it will work with the phone system—Verizon's new lines. This will cost us approximately \$8,000.00.

2/ Our Chandeliers need a way to be lowered and raised. The old way was we lowered the chandeliers with a hand winch; one of the three winches is broken and does not work. We need to replace these winches with electric ones. Just to note the last time we cleaned the chandelier was fall of 2019. This will cost us approximately \$6,000.00.

3/ Repair one of the outside spigots (old style) that the Nursery Schools uses. It is in the front of the Nursery room. This will require re-piping a new water line and new spigot. This will cost us approximately \$2,000.00.

4/ Finishing up the rewiring on the second floor of the Education Wing. Changing from old 24 volt system to the standard 110 volt system. This will cost us approximately \$2,500.00.

Children's Corner

ear Children:
"Conduct yourselves with all humility, gentleness, and patience. Accept each other with love." Ephesians 4:2

I have to admit that patience is not one of the virtues that I possess, although as I have aged and have more time, I am somewhat better. As I reflect back on my school days, I am sure that I was a rather impatient child. Events that would make me "squirrely" were waiting for the cold days of winter to become the sunny days of summer, hoping for Mom's apple pie to cool so I could have a slice, anxiety over my math test, etc. I am sure that each of you has had this feeling of being unsettled. Looking over my past and present anxieties, made me wonder about God's patience in dealing with his people over time. As I took a look through the Bible, I came across a few examples of God's abundant patience - His patience with leading the people to the Promised Land as they continually strayed off the righteous path. They grumbled and doubted, but God heard their pleas and answered their prayers. Christ's patience as he was led from Palm Sunday, through the trial, the Crucifixion, and finally the Resurrection!! God continues to be patient with us as He leads us when we take a "wrong turn" and sets us on the path of righteousness. I have started to think about ways to deal with impatience and came up with a few-prayer as a starter, writing down my blessings, calling a friend who is having difficulty, deep breathing exercises, music of your choice, working on a hobby, to name a few. The following are Biblical sources for reference: Psalm 37:7; Galatians 5:22; Romans 2:4.

So—the next time you are waiting for that special phone call, for football tryouts, for all that exercise to pay off, think of how God is patient with our lives. As the Psalmist said," I WAITED PATIENTLY FOR THE LORD AND HE HEARD MY CRY."

I can't end this piece without telling you about a wonderful tale of canine patience. Many years ago, Mr. Yost and I were traveling in Scotland. As we toured the historical city of Edinburgh, we were regaled with the story of "Grey Friar's Bobby." Bobby was an adorable little Skye terrier and the owner was John who was a night watchman working for the city. Bobby and John were inseparable for many years and the little dog demonstrated an unusual bond with his owner. John died and with mournful sadness, Bobby guarded his master's grave DAILY for 14 years in the graveyard of Greyfriars Kirk yard. Bobby then passed away and their graves are side by side as the little terrier is still watching after his beloved John.

Dear Parents:

Anyone who has been a parent certainly can identify with "patience" or lack of it. Homework, eating habits, friends,

driving and who gets the car, questions of faith—just to mention a few of the worries that contribute to "gray hair." Perhaps Psalm 37:7 will give you a taste of perspective —"Be still before the Lord and wait patiently for him; do not fret when people succeed in their ways, when they carry out their wicked schemes."
