Rejoice in the Lord always, and again I say, rejoice! –

Renewing Financial Appeal. And we have much to celebrate. After three years we have accomplished a great deal.

Our Restoration Project has been completed, with the replacement of our heating system, new air conditioning installed throughout the facility, removal of hazardous materials and buried oil tanks, conversion to natural gas, installation of new windows, doors and floors, renovation of the "not so Knotty-Pine" room, rebuilding of the front portico, replacement and addition of sump pumps and dehumidification system in Elbert Hall, installation of a new emergency generator, and the rebuilding of our pipe organ.

The project was made possible by the congregation's generous response to the financial appeal. As we entered into the Appeal we received pledges from 88 households, totaling \$277,435. At the end of the Appeal we received from those pledging households \$299,338! And that is not all. We also have had many households give, often regularly, to the Appeal even though they were not comfortable making a stated pledge. When the gifts from these members and friends are included, we have received \$378,571 in the Restoring, Rebuilding, Renewing Financial Appeal! Can you see why we are rejoicing?

In addition to these gifts made to the RRR Appeal directly by members and friends, we also received gifts from other offerings, such as unnamed gifts in pew envelopes, and gifts to the project in memory of departed loved ones. These receipts tallied in the tens of thousands of dollars. Can you see why we are rejoicing?

We used money from the Endowment Account to make this work happen as well, in the amount of \$435,600. We also had some reserves in our Nursery School account which helped with the courtyard, windows and doors, and the knotty pine room in the amount of \$76,000. Add to that the loan from the Mission Investment Fund of \$790,000, and we were able to accomplish what many thought would be impossible to do in a time of deep national, and for many of our people, deep personal recession.

Yet another reason we rejoice is for the gift the Mission Investment Fund is to the Church. The interest we pay on our loan (a very reasonable 5%) is reinvested in other congregations as they either build new churches, or, like us, renovate existing ministry sites. The Church supports the Church in a way that the secular banks are not able to do, as new congregations do not have any credit history to be verified for starter loans. This is where the Mission Investment Fund steps in. And we rejoice.

We were blessed to have the assistance of faithful partners in ministry, particularly Pr. Renee Liabraaten and Kairos Associates, who worked with our congregation to set a vision for ministry and define why we needed this money. We were blessed by many in our congregation who worked on this Appeal and Project, particularly (though certainly not limited to!) our Appeal chairs Meredith Harris and Craig Gardner, and our Project managers Joe Regan, Jim Snyder and Bob Potter. In these we rejoice.

The verse we used for our Appeal is from 2 Chronicles 24:13 "So those who were engaged in the work labored, and the repairing went forward at their hands, and they restored the house of God to its proper condition and strengthened it." Thanks to you, the labor went forward, and the temple of the Lord is better than ever. Rejoice in the Lord! Again I say, Rejoice!

The Shift Begins:

Appeal, we now need to shift our attention back to fully funding the ministry we do in this building. As we have said from the beginning, we are not restoring the building to be a museum or a monument. We are restoring the building so that it can be used. The building is a tool, a resource, to accomplish the work Jesus gives us to do in this community, as we work to Connect People and Change Lives through Jesus Christ. As we have such a large facility, there will always be things that need repair and attention. We will keep the building fund envelope in our monthly packets, and money given in it will be dedicated for the building (at this time, primarily for the roof.) However, now that the Project is completed, we need to shift our primary support to the ministry we do under this roof.

In this building meals are prepared for Aid for Friends, food and supplies are collected for Loaves and Fishes, thousands of units are gathered in the Souper Bowl of Caring, school kits are gathered and made for children who need supplies for learning. In this building hundreds of children are educated in our Christian Nursery School, our Sunday School and Vacation Bible School. Adults come together here to study the Bible, to make quilts for Ronald McDonald House and Lutheran World Relief, to make health kits and support Silver Springs – Martin Luther School. In this building Girl Scouts and Boy Scouts from Cubs to Eagles gather and grow. In this building Jesus Christ is worshipped and adored, and people approach the throne of grace in praise and supplication.

This entire ministry needs our support. In these past three years we have been supporting this work for Jesus, but we have had our attention diverted by the needed restoration to the facility in which we do this work. Our support for the Restoration Appeal has been tremendous. But we have also seen the ongoing support of our work in this place fall short. A portion of that which needs to be supported now that we are finished with the Restoration Project is the increased loan we needed to make this project possible.

Several families have heard the call to shift financial support back to the general fund for ministry. On the day we celebrated the conclusion of the Appeal we received special gifts to the general fund of \$6,000! This is in addition to many families who, now that their Restoration Appeal pledge is completed, have shifted a portion of that giving back to support of the work done in this building. You are invited to join this trend, making the funding of our ministry strong again. Thanks be to God!

The Widow's Might!

Many are familiar with the Bible story of the widow who was praised by Jesus for giving two copper coins, worth barely a penny. He commented that since this was all she had to live on, she had given more than all those who had given from their abundant wealth to the treasury in the temple. This story is often called "The Widow's Mite." (A "mite" was the smallest of all coins in Jewish currency.) Saint Matthew has been blessed by a widow, our beloved Florence Lutz, who through devotion to Jesus and thoughtful planning was able to make a "might"-y difference for our ministry.

Florence, who passed away in December, had two insurance policies in which Saint Matthew was named a beneficiary. When these policies were disbursed, Saint Matthew received \$8,000! Our policy for such undesignated gifts to the congregation is to put a portion into our "Undesignated Bequests/Memorials" fund, which can be used for the expenses of our ongoing ministry, and a portion to our Endowment Fund to allow that fund to grow to ensure our future financial security. What a tremendous gift Florence (and Ralph) Lutz made to the work we do in Jesus' name. We are grateful to God for their faithful stewardship of what God blessed them with.

When I was a little girl, I remember a very popular song "Cruising Down the River on a Sunday Afternoon" - and I used to imagine all the wonderful sights I might see while I would be relaxing on the deck of a boat sipping some lemonade. About as close to that vision was a little trip on a weathered old row boat putting worms on a hook (or rather Dad was doing that) on Tyler Lake. Well, I finally got to live my dream a few weeks ago when Mr. Yost and I (plus several Maris Grovers) headed to Amsterdam and boarded a lovely river boat and embarked on a wonderful sightseeing voyage on the waterways of Holland and Belgium. This time, instead of trying to hook some fish, I looked for ways in which the Creator has shown His love for us and I wasn't disappointed. The third sign was **Artistry** - as we toured St. John's Church and admired the exquisite stained glass. The fourth sign was **Honor** - we made a

special stop at the Liberation Museum - this stop was an emotional visit in remembrance of the valiant American and Canadian soldiers who liberated the people of the Netherlands after years of cruel occupation by Hitler's army. The fifth sign was **Kindness** - a small group of us were guests of a Dutch family and we had a wonderful exchange of cultures, tea and goodies. They were very anxious to hear about life in the United States and, of course, we certainly enjoyed hearing about their schools, home life, families, etc. - this was done in their colorful garden while eating appetizers and drinking tea. What fun!! Now, for number six - **Beauty** - and probably the main reason for going to the Netherlands - tulips. We saw field after field containing various species of tulips and other flowers; gardens too; beautifully clothed in all the colors of the rainbow - what a glorious gift from the Creator - I have never seen such vast arrays of color in my life!

What marvelous events that God places in our path - we just have to notice them and give thanks. What events have you noticed this past week?
