

"In baptism our gracious heavenly Father frees us from sin and death by joining us to the death and resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ. We are born children of a fallen humanity; by water and the Holy Spirit we are re-born children of God and made members of the church, the body of Christ. Living with Christ and in the communion of saints, we grow in faith, love, and obedience to the will of God."

What difference does Baptism make?

his is the topic we will explore together as we move through the season of Lent. We know that it is important to be baptized. We bring our children to receive this sacrament. But what difference does it make? Does it matter in our day-to-day living? Does it make a difference in our relationships with others? Does it make any impact on the world?

In the Baptismal service we speak these words:
As you bring *your children* to receive the gift of baptism, you are entrusted with responsibilities: to live with *them* among God's faithful people, bring *them* to the word of God and the holy supper, teach *them* the Lord's Prayer, the Creed, and the Ten Commandments,

place in *their* hands the holy scriptures, and nurture *them* in faith and prayer, so that *your children* may learn to trust God, proclaim Christ through word and deed, care for others and the world God made, and work for justice and peace.

And again in the Affirmation of Baptism (Confirmation) service we ask:

You have made public profession of your faith. Do you intend to continue in the covenant God made with you in holy baptism:

to live among God's faithful people,

to hear the word of God and share in the Lord's supper,

to proclaim the good news of God in Christ through word and deed,

to serve all people, following the example of Jesus, and to strive for justice and peace in all the earth?

In each of these exhortations we see the themes that define life in the Church: Fellowship (support of brothers and sisters in Christ), Worship (praise and prayer offered to Jesus), Education (being formed in faith), Evangelism (inviting others to know Jesus), Social Ministry (caring for the needs of those in our communities), Advocacy (standing for, and with, those who do not have a voice).

How does our baptism empower us to live well in community with God and with neighbor? How does baptism inspire us to be all that God wishes us to be? Can baptism be more than just a ritual we do because our parents or our grandparents told us to do this for our children?

Each Wednesday in Lent we will look at a different aspect of our baptismal covenant, and ponder what difference it can make. We will gather at noon or at 7:00 p.m. for worship, conversation, and discernment on what baptism means for us as people of faith. Prior to the evening service we will gather with each other at six for a simple supper of soup and salad. Each supper will be sponsored by a different ministry team of our congregation. On that evening we will consider the work of that team as we worship.

This tradition of soup suppers during Lent was common across much of the church for a long time, It is a way for us to join with each other, and it is also a way in which we can consider what it is to live more simply, to "give up" a little of the excess in our lives. Lent is a particularly appropriate time to do this as we consider how Jesus gave everything he had in heaven to be in fellowship with us here on earth, and bring us back to God through the Cross and Resurrection.

Baptism is the way in which we become Children of God, and inheritors of eternal life. Let us explore together what difference this truth can make in our lives as we continue our journey through this world.

Wednesday Services during Lent

he Lenten season provides the opportunity to gather together more frequently as we add a mid-week service and as a result, it gives us a chance to grow closer as a community. Starting Ash Wednesday up until Holy Week, we will have a Wednesday service both at noon and at 7:00 p.m.

Various committees and organizations are taking turns hosting each soup supper. This includes Worship and Music, Social Ministry, Women of the ELCA, Fellowship, and Christian Education. Trisomy is a genetic disorder in which a person has three copies of a chromosome instead of two. This extra chromosome results in congenital malformations, serious developmental and motor delays, and a high incidence of mortality. Summary: Our preliminary Budget vs. Actual report for January shows that we started out the new year slightly in the red

in the amount of approximately \$2,700. We received about \$43,300 in Giving/Income while our expenses were \$46,000. As a reminder, for the year we have approved a budget with a total negative in the amount of \$37,000. Thank you all for your continued support for the ministry of Saint Matthew.

Giving Opportunities: At the congregational meeting in January, Joe Regan went over updates to our Building in Grace campaign. During that presentation Joe mentioned that the cost to replace an individual lighting unit in Elbert Hall would run about \$350 per lighting unit and that we needed about 18 of those units. Even if you have already pledged to the campaign, would you also be able to additionally pay for all or part of one unit or for multiple fixtures for this project. The more we continue to raise for this campaign will allow us to finish the necessary repairs earlier and allow us to have additional funds to tackle other items on the project. Any donation is extremely helpful.

ear Children, "The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; Those who have lived in a land of deep darkness—on them light has shined." Isaiah 9:2

Except for the dark and somber days of nightly winters when I can put on my cozy slippers, don my cuddly bath robe, and nestle down with a book, I have never been a fan of darkness. Several years ago, Mr. Yost and I took the grandchildren to a cave in Central Pennsylvania. I was a little anxious as we descended the steep stone stairs. The terrain of the dimly lit cave became very rugged and although the display of stalactites, stalagmites and ponds were beautiful, I felt "hemmed in" and was ready to leave. Because the other three members were enjoying every minute, I did manage to "ride the course," but was a "Happy Camper" when we finally ascended the stairs and saw the sunshine. Although this was a fun excursion into the unknown, there are many times in our lives that we walk in darkness—when a good friend moves away, a struggle with school, a sick relative, and so many more sad times. We are lucky, however, to have Jesus who will walk with us through the darkness and bring us into the light. I deliberately chose the subject of "light" for this month's Children's Corner because since November, we have endured early darkness making it difficult to play and work outside-but along comes SPRING-with long days of sunlight, buds popping on the trees, flowers blooming, birds singing, etc. What JOY!!!! Remember, children, that Jesus is always in our lives to help us over the dark portions of our lives—take advantage of this and remember to ask him for help. Ilver Springs-Martin Luther School is looking for reading volunteers. The school started using a new program called Leveled Literacy Interventions and has seen great success. Some kids have increased their reading two grade levels since September and are now reading at grade level! The system is scripted and volunteers would guide small groups of students (3-4 at most) through a 30-minute lesson helping them with reading and writing. Ideally, a volunteer could come 1-2 times a week for an hour or two and in that time would see a couple groups of kids. Volunteers will be trained in using the system by one of our great reading specialists.

There's a little paperwork involved. One of the reading specialists at the school offered to have anyone interested in volunteering visit and observe a lesson to see if it's a good fit for them. If you are interested in this, please contact Nancy Regan.
