ovember is a busy month in the Church year. It begins with All Saints Sunday, where we remember those saints who have died in the past year, and give thanks for those new saints who were baptized in the past year. Later in the month we have Christ the King Sunday, marking the end of the Church year, then Thanksgiving Day, a national holiday with religious overtones, and finally the First Sunday in Advent as a new liturgical calendar begins. This month surely keeps our altar team busy, as the colors of the paraments change every week! Each of these special events gives us an opportunity to gather as a family of faith, and an opportunity to reach out as a faith community to our neighborhood. One way we will reach out to our neighbors will be to, as we did last year, convert the tent into the "All Saints Chapel." This was a wonderful way to allow the community to remember their beloved departed, as people wrote the names of their loved ones on a piece of cloth and fastened it to a lattice hung for this purpose. Prayers and reflections were available all week, and names were added daily to the frame. It was very moving to then have a brief service of remembrance on the evening of All Saints Sunday, at which we prayed for the families of those remembered on the strips of cloth. Our members are welcome to add names as well, even as we remember the members of Saint Matthew who have passed in our Sunday morning worship services.

We will also have an opportunity to invite the community to worship with us as we host the Community Thanksgiving service. As usual, this service will be held on the Wednesday before Thanksgiving Day at 7:00 p.m. We are looking forward to having a choir made up of members of each of the Springfield congregations, as well as the opportunity to worship across denominational lines, giving thanks to the one Lord and savior of us all. Please mark the date and join with us as we welcome our sisters and brothers in Christ from across the township.

Unbelievably we are approaching Advent already! As we get ready for a new church year, we are bringing back a favorite liturgy, the Holden Village evening prayer service. We have not used this for several years, in part because our desire for midweek worship seemed to have faded. Still, we like this service very much, and are trying to find new and renewed ways to bring people into the presence of God. And so, we will offer this additional opportunity to prepare our hearts for the coming of the Lord Jesus among us on Wednesday evenings during Advent. If you know this service, you are familiar with its beauty. If you are not familiar with it, plan to come and experience this form of Evening Prayer. Make it a part of your Advent to carve out time for prayer and reflection in a calming space and worship service.

November is a busy month, but it is a wonderful time for worship and fellowship. May you feel the blessing of God in your families, in our congregation, and in our community as together we give thanks and praise to Jesus all month long!

Upcoming Events:

The evening of November 1st through Sunday evening, November 6th, the All Saints Chapel will return in our courtyard under the tent. The chapel is open to the community to pause in a time of reflection and remembrance of loved ones. Last year we had over 75 people from Saint Matthew and from the community take the time to visit the chapel and over 100 names were written on muslin strips that were tied to the lattice board. Please note that while we may most keenly feel the loss of those recently gone, this is also a place to remember loved ones from the past. There are others like me who do not have a local gravesite to visit, but can place a remembrance on our lattice board. The week will culminate in a candlelit service under the tent at 6:00 p.m. on the evening of November 6th.

On Sunday morning, November 6th, we will honor the lives of our departed saints as well as our newly baptized specifically from our Saint. Matthew family whose names will be read at both services. In addition, as part of both services, members of the congregation will be invited to light a candle for those they wish to honor and remember.

On Wednesday, November 23rd, on Thanksgiving Eve, at 7:00 p.m. we will host the Springfield Ministerium Thanksgiving service. This is a long-time tradition in Springfield to bring together the community in Thanksgiving and fellowship. The offering collected that evening will go towards the work of the Springfield Ministerium.

Sunday, November 27th, is the first Sunday in Advent as we celebrate the beginning of a new church year and light the first candle in our wreath. Stay tuned for our Advent and Christmas schedules.

Summary: For the month of September we were in the negative in the amount of \$13,000. while YTD we are in the negative in the amount of \$36,100. (Budgeted loss for the year is \$38,000). From a budget standpoint we are behind in envelope giving by about \$12,700 for the year. If you are behind on your giving and have the opportunity to catch up or to make extra donations, that would be greatly appreciated. Let's keep up with increased giving over the last quarter of the year.

Birds in the Belfry! Giving Opportunity: Did you know that as part of our renovations we discovered that birds had found an entry point near the front of the Church and were using the rafters as their own Bed and Breakfast? We unfortunately needed to use the exterminator to get rid of our feathered friends as well as all that they left behind. The access point has now been covered up as well. The cost for this last month was \$2,500, which is an unexpected hit to our repair budget. Would you be able to help by offsetting this cost by paying some or all of this expense?

ear Children, Every time I think of the month of November, the words bountiful, harvest, thankful, and generosity come to

mind. I remember as a young bride, my mother-in-law loved to go to any of the plentiful Farmers' Markets in the Lancaster area. She loved looking over and purchasing wonderful-looking fruits and vegetables. Upon arriving home she thought about which items she would can, freeze or make into jam. She often gave the jam away. Looking back on my teenage years, one of my favorite memories was helping Dad on our property; he had a large produce farm as a hobby. He grew corn, blueberries, squash, strawberries, tomatoes, peppers, and a few potatoes, etc. People from town came to buy these luscious items and John and I had fun helping with the selling—we got to meet people and chat. As each season began, Dad would say, "Now kids, if you see a family with lots of kids arriving in a car that has seen better days, do NOT charge them the full price."

One of Dad's stories that I always like to share is that on Sunday mornings before church, he would load a wheelbarrow with a nice variety of produce complete with the prices and a box with change. When we came home from church, the wheelbarrow was always empty and Dad had more money than was warranted. That produce patch was a glimmer of light and a parcel of fun as we went through the garden and popped a sweet pea, a handful of blueberries, a ripe tomato, a stalk of asparagus in our mouths. For neighbors, parishioners, and those traveling through the area—the Williams Produce represented a moment of reprieve as good conversation mixed with a basket of strawberries was the event of the day.

Dad was always so pleased that the veggies and fruit grew so well because the soil, known as "hard pan" made his work quite challenging as he did not use chemical fertilizer. Dad was one of the first believers in Climate Change and he fertilized with old rotten fruit and veggies that the local stores were happy to give to Dad—he plowed it under to nourish the soil. He seemed to operate this Patch by rather old-fashioned methods—using the sky for signs of rain, experimentation with plowing, and rotating the various crops. Dad's interest for saving Planet Earth and sharing his bountiful harvest with others were two great gifts he gave John and me.

Dear Parents,

Although it is not the time to PLANT a garden, it is time to PLAN a garden. A few strawberry plants will make a "ho-hum" breakfast into a taster's delight. Science lessons abound as you check the weather and organize your work so that you are protecting the planet. Sharing your garden should be the high point.
